MEN'S GET TOGETHER

At our July meeting John Avery told us about "Mary Seacole; The Lady Without The Lamp", who was born in 1805 in Kingston, Jamaica, of Scottish/African descent. She set up a "British Hotel" behind the lines in the Crimean War, describing it as a "mess-table and comfortable quarters for sick and convalescent officers". It also provided succour for servicemen wounded on the battlefield. She was posthumously awarded the Jamaican Order of Merit in 1991 and, in 2004, voted the greatest black Briton. Mary acquired knowledge of herbal medicine in the Caribbean. When the Crimean War broke out she applied to the War office to assist but was refused, so she travelled independently and set up her hotel, becoming extremely popular among service personnel who raised money for her when she later faced destitution.

After her death she was forgotten for almost a century but is today celebrated as a woman who successfully combated racial prejudice. Her biography "Wonderful Adventures of Mrs. Seacole in Many Lands" is one of the earliest autobiographies of a mixed-race woman although some aspects of its accuracy have been questioned and claims made that her achievements have been exaggerated for political reasons. The erection of her statue at St. Thomas's Hospital in London this year describing her as a "pioneer nurse" has generated controversy. For our meeting on 4th August

Arthur Fairchild will describe "Flat Bottomed Boats", an account of a journey undertaken in 1945 from Plymouth to Cochin in India in a tank landing craft designed merely to cross the Channel!

At our meeting on 1st September we will welcome a representative from the Hampshire & IOW Wildlife Trust, telling us about its work including wildlife and habitat protection.

We meet at 10 a.m. on the first Thursday of the month at the Community Centre, always pleased to welcome new members and visitors.

The two latest talks were given by members. When the speaker failed to turn up last month Treasurer Rodney Betts, a retired banker, stepped forward to save the day. The general idea that a banker's life is one of boring routine was rapidly dispersed as he described all that happened to him during a long career. As a young man starting at the Midland Bank in Norwich, he learned how to deal with all types of accounts, read signatures and, later, computerised banking. Rodney's "off the cuff" talk was a great success and he held the audience's interest from start to finish.

Two weeks later Lester Ruckley gave an illustrated talk on campanology, covering the history and casting of bells, their weights and the art of ringing them. Monks used handbells as far back as 500 AD and, later, bells were hung in church towers - first a single and now up to 13 in big churches and cathedrals. The casting and tuning of these heavy bells (originally in a field near the church and now in foundries) was interesting. The outer cope and inner core are made from goat hair and cow dung, and molten metal is poured into this casing. Tuning is achieved by scraping slivers of metal until the correct pitch is acquired. Now, computerised

testing replaces the tuning fork! Lester involved six people from the audience in trying to master the art of ringing changes; they certainly required a lot more training!
